The Society was established in November 1969. Its aims: "to promote an appreciation of children's books, and to study their history, bibliography and literary content." There is a Day Seminar in London each year. The Society has helped to organise conferences on the history of children's books. Three substantial Newsletters are issued per year, and an Occasional Paper from time to time.

Every other year the Harvey Darton Award is presented, it is a biennial award given by the Society for the book which contributes fresh and detailed knowledge to the history of British children's books published during the previous two years, recognising that such material may appear within a broader context than the purely historical, such as bibliographies, biographies, and wider literary and critical works.
